#### Vale S.A.M.

Sheila Muhlemann (or 'Mum' as she has been known by hundreds of Ermysted's boys) first meandered unwittingly into school in 1985, as a part-time teacher of Mathematics. Little did she know then that she was about to found a veritable dynasty of Muhlemanns, one which has continued to this day. Nor did she realise then that she would eventually enter the history books in a sensational manner which rocked the male bastions of the staff commonroom to its very roots. She is in fact the joint holder of the title of First Female Fulltime member of staff at Ermysted's, which in its five hundred year history had (rightly or wrongly) never allowed women to hold such a hallowed position. Fittingly, this cherished title was granted in 1992, at the quincentennial celebrations of the founding of the school.

One member of staff who recollects her first appearance in school describes her as 'having this amazing head of bushy hair. She looked like a wild woman.' Given the lack of female facilities in the school at the time, she was within her rights to behave as a wild woman too.

Sheila made the sensible move to the English department and studied for an MA at York University. This led her to becoming the rock and foundation stone of the department, which then went from strength to strength. She became an expert teacher of Advanced level Literature, and readily took on the new Advanced level English language (which entailed many hours of after-school study and preparation.)

A dedicated professional, all her lessons were excellently prepared, interesting and rigorous. She knew instinctively how to maintain pupils' interest, while getting them to work to the best of their ability. She also provided a comforting word to those sixth-formers who fled to her room, having suffered a verbal savaging by the head of department.

Sheila has always put the pupils' welfare first, even above her own health. When suffering from cancer, and forbidden for medical reasons from entering school, she gave lessons to the upper sixth in her own home, so concerned was she that the boys' education did not suffer because of her absence. Utterly selfless, she has always given freely of her time. Many sixth formers who have not achieved the university grades they required have rung her in the summer holidays, asking for her help, and she has always obliged.

She is completely unruffled by anything, be it her own serious illness, or the vicissitudes of teaching. Only once has she been seen to lose her temper, and even that was in defence of a boy who she felt had been dealt an injustice by a callous management.

She was for years the stalwart of the dramatic productions, managing both the makeup and costumes for the plays. Indeed one year she made most of the costumes herself. She has sorted out problems of staff and boys over the years with her ever-present smile, or been equally efficacious with a bag of doughnuts. In an age when it is fashionable to decry teacher's contributions, Sheila's contribution to the life and future success of hundreds of boys has been immense. She has been commitment itself.

An unfailing professional, Sheila Muhlemann will be sorely missed by both pupils and her colleagues.

However the large part of his work here has been in the Physics department where, for the last three years, he has had the responsibility of all work at KS3. Every pupil passing through EGS knows of the intellectual powers of his dog, Sparky, and how her intelligence far surpasses that of most of our pupils.

Throughout his time here he has been responsible for and assisted with many field trips and excursions. Visits to the London Eye, Greenwich Observatory and Maritime Museum, the Faraday Lecture, Jodrell Bank and the battlefields of the First World War feature in the last twelve months alone. Present Year 11 pupils will recall his ultimate threat to sing them lullabies as he patrolled the corridors outside their dormitories in Belgium.

We are losing a multi-talented, devoted member of staff whose contributions will be seriously missed. Pupils will remember him for Greenfingers, Spaghetti Bridges and inter-form quad-cricket. #### Founders' Day

Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> December 2001

The traditional Founders' Day service was held at Holy Trinity Church in the morning. After a welcome from Rev. A. P. Botwright (Rector) the main address was given by Rev. Father T. Swinglehurst of Sacred Heart Church, Hemsworth. The retiring collection was made on behalf of The Sarah Makie Memorial Trust.

Chief guest at the Old Boys' Dinner was John Mewies. John left School in 1966 having taken his A-Levels and joined his father's firm, becoming a well-known local solicitor. John followed in his father's footsteps in that many years ago he too accepted an invitation to speak at the Society's Dinner. This was, perhaps, the first time that this had happened.

#### Speech Day

Tuesday 9th July 2002

The prizes this year were presented by Mr Bill Beaumont, O.B.E. Sports Broadcaster, British Lions and England (1975-1982).

The vote of thanks was given by Mr J. S. Spence and seconded by Oliver Brewer (Head Boy).

Oliver handed over the badge of office to next year's Head Boy, James Viney.

Mr Ashworth's speech included the following extracts:

At A-Level (2001 results), the number of A and B grades was 66.7% - two out of every three. These impressive results placed the School in the top 30 state schools in the country and as noted in the Sunday Times 'Parent Power' supplement, the best in the North of England

Fifteen boys satisfied the requirements for entry at Oxford or Cambridge – by far and away a record for the School (11 for Oxford, 4 at Cambridge).

GCSE results saw an increase in the number of A\* or A grades over recent years though this may have been in line with the national trend. Ben Lay achieved an outstanding 10 A\* grades whilst another nine boys achieved 10 A\* or A grades. Ben Lister performed particularly well in the Technology paper focusing on Electronic Products, where his mark placed him in the top five candidates out of the 12.500+ candidates who sat the paper.

Ermysted's gained a Sportsmark Award from Sport England, the brand name of the English Sports Council. The award is in recognition of the School's provision and commitment to Physical Education and School sport and for the work done to develop sport and an active lifestyle for young people.

In December, confirmation was received from the DfES that our bid to develop a project providing three new Technology workshops, an ICT room and four additional classrooms had been accepted. [The building will be built around the site of the old greenhouse.] The project has been agreed on the basis of the estimated Governors' expenditure in terms of £1.079.000 though given that Ermysted's is a Voluntary Aided School, the grant will be paid at only 90% of this figure, with the Governors being required to raise the remainder. Work started in the summer holidays with a completion date for the new building being July 2003.

We have been also been successful in being allocated just over £100.000 to refurbish the Science Laboratories. The plans are for a new building within the inner quad to house both a chemical store room and prep room. In addition, the ACL will be enlarged (by knocking through to the old chemistry prep room) and the six science laboratories will all be refurbished by summer 2003. A further bid is already in place to enable us at a later date to transform the present Technology workshops into two additional science laboratories. These are all accommodation issues that were severely criticised in the January 2001 OfSTED report.

Further plans are in the pipeline to convert the current Sixth Form Common Room into a two storey Library.

# Music and Drama Review Music Report

This was an exceptionally busy year for the department with new ensembles, concerts and new ventures to report upon.

#### **ENSEMBLES**

#### **Big Band**

Record numbers in the band have confirmed the popularity of this ensemble and they have had a splendid year of achievements. They played in the Christmas and Easter Concerts, at the Summer Fair and at the PTA "Jazz 'n Jive" evening. This latter was a great success raising over £680 for the association. Those who attended showed some reticence at dancing but the final set produced a result. It was an experiment of sorts but was such a success that it will be repeated next year. The PTA had provided brand new stands and banners for the band and they now look the business in concert.

The band was sorry to say farewell to Alex Dobson, the final "Founder Member" of the band who had been playing since it began seven years ago. On the other hand we were delighted to welcome three new recruits from SGHS - Rachel Dunbar, Gill Enzor and Hannah Beck. New members from EGS included Rory Enright, Stephen Bloxham, Andrew Enzor, David Eells, Oliver Pike, Chris Pollitt, Andrew Bailey, Ben Lloyd-Evans, Chris Holden and William Green. #### Senior Choir

Edward Green leaves this year and he will be fondly remembered for his strange coats. 
#### Oliver!

It has been another successful year for the Art department. Pupils have produced a wide range of high quality work in a variety of media, ranging from the traditional (paint, clay etc) to the more contemporary (wire, molten plastics, latex...)

In January 2002 year 11, 12 and 13 pupils took part in a trip to the Tate Modern Gallery in London. This was a huge success and proved inspiring not just because of the work on display, but also because of the atmosphere generated by the architecture of the location.

The annual art exhibition took place on the 9th and 10th of July 2002. Exam work from the GCSE, AS and A Level courses were showcased along with a selection of work from lower school pupils. Parents viewed the work on the 9th of July and feedback was all very positive. The high quality and wide range of work was commented upon. Governors and teachers had an opportunity to view the work on the 10th of July, after Speech Day.

As well as the extensive displays of work around the school, a network gallery was launched in June 2002. Students have access to this via "Classlink". ## **Sports Review**

Two Ermysted's sportsmen have achieved great distinction in their respective fields:

At the top of the School is a young man whose sporting accomplishments have been well documented in the pages of the Craven Herald. The qualities that Oliver Brewer has brought to his role as Head Boy are memorable and distinguished and also permeate his contribution to School and representative athletics over his seven years at Ermysted's. His achievements include representing North Yorkshire 27 times at cross-country and on the track, he also represented England in the G.B. Schools Championships in 1998. To honour his singular contribution to County sport, he has been awarded a clock, as well as a nomination for the Donaldson Trophy. Records reveal that no one has matched his record of appearances in a County vest. A combination of ability, determination, loyalty and a self-effacing, yet totally focused and shrewd personality have ensured his considerable and deserved success.

Scott Thwaites is just at the start of his time at the School, as he approaches the end of his first year. His successes in the cycling world have been both varied and remarkable. From hill-climbs to roller-racing, timetrial to grass-track, Scott has achieved national distinction and has become National Champion in two disciplines, as well as winning the Best All Rounder Award. Although his achievements have taken place outside of the School curriculum, Scott and his family recognise the benefits derived from PE, Swimming and Athletics towards his general physical conditioning.

#### **Athletics 2002**

The athletics season started with the English Schools Athletics Association Track and Field Cup, held in York in May. The year 8 team finished in equal third, with some noteworthy performances from Cameron Herd in the Shot (10.71m), James Kelly and John Marsh in the 1500m (5 mins 11 secs and 5 mins 10 secs respectively) and Nick Green in the 200m (29.6s). Meanwhile, the year 10 team finished in 5th place, on the face of it disappointing, but the team contained some year 9 pupils who had to work extremely hard to keep up with year 10 opposition. Again, performances worthy of mention came from Matthew Brennand in the shot (26.85m), Justin Murr in the High Jump (1.56m) and 200m (24.9s) and Seb Pickles and Mark Taylor in the high hurdles (14.1s for both).

The next instalment of the season came via the **Harrogate and Craven Area Trials**, held at Leeds Metropolitan University. Again this was a May meeting and again some pupils performed extremely well. The aim of the meeting was to qualify for the Harrogate and Craven team to compete in the North Yorkshire Championships, for which the following qualified:

Ben Rusius - Junior Boys 1500m James Rusius - Intermediate Boys Steeplechase Matthew Ackers-Johnson - Intermediate Boys Triple Jump Ben Holland - Intermediate Boys Discus Justin Murr - Intermediate Boys High Jump Oliver Brewer - Senior Boys Steeplechase

At the **North Yorkshire Championships**, Ben Rusius, James Rusius, Matthew Ackers-Johnson and Oliver Brewer qualified to represent North Yorkshire and in recognition of representing the county on no less than 27 occasions, Oliver was presented with a commemorative clock by the NYYSSA. After the Inter-Counties meeting, Ben Rusius and Oliver Brewer reached the **English Schools Athletics Championships** in Nottingham held in July, where both pupils did very well, Oliver finishing l0th overall and Ben 9th.

At the end of May, a year 8 team and a year 10 team took part in the first **Keighley and District Schools Athletics Meeting**, held at Greenhead school, Keighley. This meeting was the first of two, with the points scores from the two being totalled to give an overall score for each school involved. After this first meeting, both teams found themselves in second place.

Top performers on the day were:

Thomas French - lst, 400m, John Marsh - 2nd, 1500m, Cameron Herd - 3rd, shot James Finucane - 1st, javelin, Matthew Redfearn - lst, high jump.

Year 10

Justin Murr - 1st, high jump and 200m, Greg Coughlin – 2nd, 400m, Tom Clarke - 1st, 800m Matthew Brennand - 2nd, discus, Robert Davy - 1st, long jump.

At this meeting, **Justin Murr** equalled the school high jump record of 1.74m, while the relay team of **Murr**, **Davidkhanian**, **Coughlin and Davy** broke the school relay record.

At the second meeting in July, the year 10 team consisted of year 9 pupils due to work experience, but they did not disappoint anybody. Indeed, the year 8 and 9 team held on for second spot overall, thanks to marvellous team efforts. Only Oakbank school, a specialist sports college, and South Craven, with a roll of over 1600 pupils, put the boys under any sort of pressure. Some year 9 pupils who did very well were Tom McAnespie (1500m), Szabolcs Sovago (800m) and Anthony Connor (Long Jump and 100m). Unfortunately, the meeting was abandoned two thirds of the way through due to rain, so who knows what the boys may have achieved with the relays still to run?!

Finally, the **Craven Area Championships** were held at Settle Middle School in June. These differ from the previous area trials as it is a local fixture and not part of a nationally recognised structure, so the boys could not qualify for the County or English Schools Championships directly from the meeting. Instead, the pupils were aiming to become area champion, then Harrogate and Craven Champion at the subsequent meeting held at Leeds Metropolitan University in July. ## 1st XI Cricket 2002

It had been raining all morning, before we reached Stoneyhurst College in the afternoon. This meant that conditions on an already demanding 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile course were considerably worsened. Because of varying alternative commitments only 7 runners from years 10, 11 and 12 represented Ermysted's. The sheer distance of the course and the atrocious conditions made the race all the more challenging. All of our runners finished - which is a feat in itself! Unusually 6 runners counted for the team as opposed to the normal 3 or 4, which meant that everyone's individual place was important. The depleted Ermysted's team was placed 8th out of the 13 teams that entered. All of our runners finished comfortably within the top 100. Strong performances were noted from Mark Ashton and Luke Porter.



EGS Relays - We hosted our annual relays which were unfortunately affected by late withdrawals and ended up as a head to head match against Oakbank sports college, Keighley. The U12s had a strong chance of glory and did not disappoint. The race was over as a spectacle after Tom Anderson ran the fastest time of the day on the first leg. Indeed Tom's time even beat all the year 8 & 9 runners who were to follow in the next race. The lead was easily maintained in the next legs, by Joe Porter, Alex Baldwin and Scott Thwaites, who all ran good times. The U14s were hampered by the absence of three of their fastest runners and would probably have won if they had been available. However, the runners who could make it performed admirably in sub zero arctic winds. Ed Cowan and Thomas Mountain battled well on the first leg with Thomas beating Ed by just 2 seconds to give the 'B' Team second place ahead of our 'A' Team. Jeremy Gee then took over for the 'A' team and lifted them up into second place. Luke Greenway and John Marsh then ensured Silver medals for the 'A' Team ahead of Bronze for our 'B' Team. Our.B team had some excellent performances with Jeremy Gee, Alex Witek and Barney Newbould all breaking 7 minutes. The U16s had very strong opposition and their race was closely contested until Sam Clegg ran the fastest time of the day on the last leg to deny them victory. Good times were run by David Taylor, James Rusius and Matthew Ackers-Johnson, who all broke 12 minutes for 2 laps. Thomas Clarke also ran well with a time of 12.08. The U18s didn't have any opposition but ran against the U16's. They ran well with Charles Baxter leading them in on the first leg before Oliver Brewer ran the fastest 2 lap stage of the day with 10.32 to take them clear. However, Chris Rusius was hauled back on the final stage by one of the U16 teams probably due to an injury and tiredness after competing at Giggleswick the same afternoon at football. The 'B' Team were in second place with Brown, Viney and Hussain each doing fast times just over 12 minutes.

### **English Schools Cross-Country Cup**

North Yorkshire Round - Ben Rusius was the star of the show for Ermysted's as he romped to individual victory in the Intermediate (Year 9/10) race. However, he was not able to participate in the North East of England Round, as his team suffered through injuries to two athletes who last year ran in the National Final with Ben. The team finished fourth of the 8 teams when a top three spot was required to progress. The Juniors (Year 7/8) showed how important the whole team is in this competition by getting their 4 scoring athletes inside the top 14 finishers resulting in runners-up spot, out of the nine teams.

North East of England Round - Ermysted's Junior (U13) Team qualified for this year's National Final of the English Schools' Cross-Country Cup by Finishing as Runners-up on Saturday 10/11/01 in the North East of England Round of this year's competition at Acklam near Middlesbrough. The 12 teams of 6 runners from all over the North East lined up for each age group. James Kelly and John Marsh led the way finishing 8th and 9th respectively, but this is a team competition and they only get the chance to run in the final because of the excellent support from their team-mates. Oliver Gee and Tom Anderson (who is only in year 7) completed the team finishing 17th & 18th respectively for a team total of 52 points only 6 behind the winners. The nonscorers were also very high up in the top half of the field of 72 runners. Thomas Mountain was 35th and Scott Thwaites 36th.

National Final - Our Junior (U13) Team ran in the national final of this prestigious event. Well over 400 teams from all over the country had set out in October and the best 24 teams had reached this far. We had hopes for a high team placing after they had qualified a close second in the NE of England Round. Realistically they were never going to win but did have hopes of a top ten finish. We had travelled down on Friday and stayed at Stratford Youth Hostel, so we were quite refreshed and raring to go with captains Oliver Brewer and Chris Rusius to cheer on the team. The race itself was set in palatial surroundings with literally a gothic temple, tower or folly on every corner. The race began in excellent conditions on a wet and surprisingly hilly course. After the early charge James Kelly was tucked in, about 20th place, with John Marsh in close attendance. Their personal battle to be first home for school was good to watch as John got the better of the contest finishing in 33rd, with James 40th (80 places higher than last year). A really impressive run from Oliver Gee saw him home in 49th only 15 seconds adrift of John. Unfortunately Tom Anderson was not at his Area Championship winning best finishing 30 seconds but more importantly 46 places behind Oliver in 95th (The same position as Oliver Brewer in 1995, so let's hope he too can be runner-up next year!). Their team score did beat their NE of England rivals but was only good enough for 14th team in the final, nevertheless a tremendous achievement to get to a national final. The non-scorers were Thomas Mountain and Alex Baldwin who will have both gained valuable experience for the future.

Harrogate & Craven Area Championships - Ermysted's have enjoyed more than their fair share of success at Cross-Country over the past decade but this is no accident. This was another illustration of how hard work and dedication on the training field reaps its rewards in competition. Individuals were racing against up to 80 runners and still we had four area champions. In the team events 20 schools took part with at least 12 teams in each of the younger age groups. We won 3 of these and more success looks likely as 2 of the victories were in the first two age groups, with the other success at senior level. I wonder how coincidental it is that these are the age groups who regularly attend training? I also think that the introduction of a captain's training session on Thursday lunchtimes has paid dividends and they can be justifiably proud of their teams' success.

The Year 7 race saw our new intake run for the first time against equal age group opposition and they showed just how good they are by winning the event. They were missing Scott Thwaites but the rest of the team produced a fantastic performance to support Tom Anderson who became our First Area Champion. The Year 8 team had won last year and had hopes of a repeat performance. Excellent runs from all our athletes, most notably James Kelly who gained an individual bronze, resulted in our second team title. The Year 9 team didn't recover from the late withdrawal through illness of Szabolcs Sovago. Consolation came in the form of a most impressive individual victory of the day as Ben Rusius won his third successive Area Title by a massive distance. The unluckiest team on the day was our Year 10 & 11 team which missed out on victory by 2 points. However, James Rusius took the individual title and both Ashton and Ackers-Johnson secured places in the Area Team. Our Seniors were hugely impressive as a unit and clearly won the team title with four scoring runners in the first 8 home. This included a third individual title for Oliver Brewer as he raced in these championships for the final time and fourth for his fellow Cross-Country captain Chris Rusius. The team also had Y12 athletes in 7th, 8th and 9th showing tremendous strength in depth and likely future success.

School Cross-Country - The geography department, ITV and BBC all said it would stop by lunchtime, but it didn't. The ground was always going to be wet, and by the time 600 pairs of boots had gone over it, extremely muddy. Records would be difficult to come by. However, we did get one new record for Ben Rusius in the Year 8/9 junior race, who was followed in by Szabolcs Sovago and John Marsh. The Year 7 winner was Tom Anderson closely followed by Scott Thwaites and Alex Baldwin. The Year 10/11 winner was James Rusius followed by Mark Ashton and Oliver Hurst who dead heated for a share of the runners-up spot. The Blue Ribbon event was won by Head Boy Oliver Brewer who prevented his fellow Cross-Country Captain, Chris Rusius, from making it a family clean sweep, third place went to Mr. Edward with Charles Baxter being the third pupil home.

**Northern Schools' Cross-Country Championships** - The school did outstandingly well in this most prestigious event both on a team and individual basis. Out of the 5 races we had the individual runner-up in two of them. Ben Rusius ran tremendously well in the Y9 race, bearing in mind a recent injury and virtual inactivity over the previous three weeks. Oliver Brewer, our retiring cross-country captain, in his last ever race for the school signed off on a high note by finishing second in the most competitive senior race. In addition, we had four of our five teams winning awards for placing in the top 6 teams.

The Year 7 team were magnificent becoming Northern Schools' Champions and gained the school's first ever team silverware in the 63 year history of the event. This really was a fine team effort with Tom Anderson leading the way in 4th, Alex Baldwin 11th, Scott Thwaites 13th and Joe Porter 21st. Even their non-scorers Richard Golson and Alex Witek made the top fifty finishers. This out of an entry of 27 teams of 6 shows how well they did and their team total of 49 points was 26 clear of the next team.

The Year 8 team were 5th with another low score of 74 points with John Marsh, James Kelly and Oliver Gee all making the top 15 and Jonathan Taylor completing the team with 34th place. The Year 9 team were also 5th thanks to excellent performances of Ben Rusius and Szabolcs Sovago and good support from Luke Greenway 43rd and Jeremy Gee 48th. Our Year 10/11 team unfortunately could not recover from two late withdrawals and finished in 9th place but with a very costly team total of 179 points. The seniors in addition to Oliver Brewer's runner-up spot had Chris Rusius in 24th in his last race for the school, Zoheb Hussain 29th and Charles Baxter 33rd for another low total of 85 points and Fourth place in the team competition

#### AUTUMN, 2001 — SUMMER, 2002

In the overall competition, where the points are totalled to find the best schools on the day, we finished third best school in the North of England with 488 points, only 33 points behind the winners and regretting those extremely costly absences in the U16 team. However, despair soon turned to great joy when the results of the Trefoil competition for the totals of the U12, U13 and U14 team competitions came through and we were declared the winners for the first time in the school's history. A truly astonishing achievement for a relatively small school and tremendous reward for all the years of dedicated training by the athletes.

# **Annual Report**

The Society continues to be in good heart, we have over 1920 members on our listing, unfortunately not all paying the Annual Subscription to the Society. This subscription just about covers the actual cost, plus postage, of the Chronicles.

The deaths of 10 members have been reported to the Society, namely:- Thomas Barron, Lloyd Metcalfe, Fred Pye, Roger Stansfield, Raleigh Hargreaves, W.G. Bradley, Andrew Penney, Neil Townson, Peter Windle, John Turner. Our condolences go out to their loved ones.

At the Annual General Meeting, held before the Founders' Day Dinner, the Treasurer reported a balance of £9,350 in the General Account, plus a balance of £34,233 in the Investment Account. The majority of the Investment Account total is the residue of a bequest to the Society from an Old Boy, and is held in reserve to assist the School in any special projects.

Once again the Founders' Day dinner made a handsome sum - £1,937 - towards the funds of the Society, this total sum coming from the Bar takings and the Raffle. We try to minimise the actual dinner cost, usually pitching it just over the cost price, so the Society relies on the bar and raffle to increase the Society funds.

After many years outside the control of the Society's Officers the Hartley McIntosh Scholarship Fund has come back under our complete control. A sum of £3,603, the monies of the fund, has been invested in the Investment Account.

During 2001 the Society invested £817 in new dining tables for use at the Annual Dinner, plus £1,443 towards the renewal of the stage curtains in the Memorial Hall.

Approval was given by members at the A.G.M. for the expenditure of a further £1,700 towards the completion of the renewal of the window curtains in the Memorial Hall.

To facilitate the restructuring of the Governing Body, required under the Education (School Government) Regulations 1998, Michael Harrison became the Old Boys' representative on the Governing Body. Due to a resignation from the Foundation Governors, Michael has now been re-elected to his former position as a Foundation Governor enabling the Old Boys to appoint a new representative. I am pleased to inform you that Mr A G (Tony) Barrett has been appointed to represent the Old Boys' Society on the Governing Body.

At the A.G.M. no members of the Committee reached the end of their 5 year period of service.

The Treasurer and Secretary were once again re-elected to their posts unopposed.

Representation was made to the A.G.M., via a letter, asking that the Society should consider banning smoking at the Annual Founder's Day Dinner. After discussion it was decided that the invitation to the 2002 dinner ask members to vote on the motion -

"Should smoking be banned in the Memorial Hall until all the formal business of the evening of the evening has been concluded?"

#### **Obituaries**

**Mr Thomas Barron** - Craven has lost a popular and well-known member of the farming community with the death of Thomas Barron at the age of 72.

Thomas attended Bradley Primary School and then Ermysted's before leaving to work on the family farm. He went on to take over the farm, running for a time in partnership with his brother George, also an old boy of Ermysted's. A key member of Bradley Village Hall Committee, Thomas helped to raise funds for the rebuilding of the Hall and he was also a member of the Parish Council.

In his younger days, he became a founder member of Skipton Young Farmers' Club and went on to serve it as Chairman. Thomas was also a long-serving employee at Skipton Auction Mart where he worked for the Ministry of Agriculture.

Thomas was a familiar figure for several years at the Old Boys' Dinner, capturing guests as they arrived in order to lighten their pockets of funds for raffle tickets. Thomas leaves his wife Jean, sons William and John and six grandchildren.

Mr Roger Stansfield - Roger was one of Craven's great characters. Born in 1940 he was the son of a local butcher and had an older brother, Malcolm and a younger sister, Kath.

After marrying his wife, Audrey, they rented a farm at Nappa. Roger was a founder member of "Raw Grass" - a scheme in which the Government encouraged farmers to work together for silaging on their farms. He entered Farmer of the Year and was runner-up in the Yorkshire region. He was a member of Barnoldswick and Earby Round Table serving as its Chairman in 1971. He was a part-time lecturer at Skipton Agricultural College and chairman of the Grassland Society. He was also in the Pendle Forest and Craven Hunt, helping to build the new course at Gisburn for the point to point and serving as social secretary for many years.

In 1980 he began foot trimming of cattle and when the lease on his farm ran out he took up the occupation full time and became affectionately known as "Roger Cowfoot". He travelled the length and breadth of Yorkshire and also sneaked into Lancashire although he didn't like to admit it.

He was a popular after-dinner speaker and he featured on various radio programmes discussing his unusual job and also on television including Yorkshire TV's "Dales Diary". His speaking fees were donated to a local hospice. His love of rugby stayed with him and he was a keen follower of Wharfedale where he was a vice-president, travelling to both home and away matches.

He was a friend to many and lived life to the full, packing everything and more besides into his 61 years.

Mr Andrew Penney - Andrew Penney was Barnoldswick's community pharmacist for almost 30 years up to his death from cancer at the age of 58. He played a key part in the close knit community where he worked and was much loved by customers. Right up until his death he was taking prescriptions out to his customers, some of them housebound.

Born to a Barnoldswick family, Andrew attended Gisburn Road Primary School and went on to study pharmacy at Bradford, returning to Barnoldswick on gaining his professional qualifications, eventually opening his own shop in Rainhall Road in 1973. Later he opened another shop in Victoria Road, Earby.

He was a past president of the Rotary Club of Barnoldswick and Earby and had close ties with the Barnoldswick and Earby Council of Social Services, the voluntary group that provides and runs a minibus taking West Craveners to visit loved ones at Skipton and Airedale Hospitals, taking bookings at his two shops.

Andrew was a staunch supporter of the Old Boys' Society, attending each Annual Dinner and making sure that he "rounded up" a group of six to eight each year with his friend Howard Cutler to be seated in the same place each year, nearest to the bar.

Captain John Hilton Turner - John Hilton Turner died on the 3rd July 2002 at the age of 84. Born in Skipton in 1917, the family moved to Gargrave in 1920 and he was educated at Gargrave Council School before attending Ermysted's.

On leaving school he joined the family business of Harry Turner as an apprentice joiner. John became a member of Skipton Rugby Club in about 1936 and obtained a regular first team place as a second row forward. After the war he became a committee member of the Club.

He joined the local Territorial Army in 1937 and was called up in August 1939, joining the Duke of Wellington Regiment and becoming a member of the "Dukes" rugby team. He saw service in Iceland and after returning to England in 1942 obtained a Commission. He took part in the Normandy campaign and served as an adjutant with the 6th Battalion Duke of Wellington Regiment PTC.

He rejoined the family business after the war. He was a member of Gargrave Village Institute, was appointed the first chairman of the management committee for the new village hall and ultimately became a life member. He was president of the Gargrave branch of the Royal British Legion and was also secretary and treasurer of the 6th Battalion of the Duke of Wellington Regiment Old Comrades Association for 22 years until 1997.

John had been president of the Skipton Master Builders Association, chairman for approximately 20 years of the Old Folks Rest Centre in Skipton and, in 1987, completed 25 years membership of the Rotary Club. He served on Gargrave Parish Council, was a Trustee of the Gargrave Poor Lands Charity and a member of Gargrave Cricket Club. He leaves his wife Vera, whom he married in 1939, six children, 12 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

Mr Raleigh Hargreaves - Raleigh Hunt Hargreaves died on the 20th June 2002 at the age of 87. He obtained his school certificate and matric at Ermysted's and at the age of 17 became the third generation of his family to enter the quarrying industry. He joined his father who had started Halton East Quarries in 1932 and on his father's death took over the business at the age of 22.

He became an associate member of the Institute of Highway Engineers, a member of the Institute of Directors and Managing Director of Halton East Quarries Ltd and Mountain Limestone Ltd. He served in the Limestone Federation for many years becoming President in 1966. He was chairman of the Yorkshire branch of the Institute of Quarrying and the Central Roadstone Federation.

He was a founder member of Skipton Round Table and also engaged in field sports and was a country lover. However cricket was his passion. He was secretary of Embsay Cricket Club in his early years and later President for many years. He was vice-chairman of the Craven and District Cricket League from 1937 to 1945, President from 1946 to 1971 and was ultimately a honorary life member. He played for the Hawks Cricket Club, was on the committee and then President. He was also a member of Yorkshire County Cricket Club.

As a member of Skipton Golf Club he became President from 1982 to 1986 and then a life vice-president. Additionally he was President of the local Multiple Sclerosis Society for several years. He served as a sidesman at Holy Trinity Church, Skipton for 40 years.

Raleigh has been chief guest at the Old Boys' Dinner and has always retained a keen interest in the School.

#### **Obituaries**

- Mr David Smith Born in 1922 his father had been secretary of Burnsall Feast Sports from 1910 until 1951 when David took over and served for 50 years. Excelled in track and cross-country at school, played rugby for Wharfedale and cricket for Gargrave and Burnsall. He was one of Skipton Golf Club's original directors and was both Captain and President. Joined 600 Squadron as a fighter pilot during the war and served in the Desert Air Force in the Mediterranean flying Beaufighters and Mosquitos. Married Patricia after the war and had a son, Derek. Later worked for Johnson and Johnson.
- Mr George Rumney was born in 1915. He received his accountancy qualification in 1936 and after 60 years membership of the Institute of Chartered Accountants was made a life member. During the war he served as a cipher operator throughout the Middle East and Italy, and escaped from Tobruk where 50,000 allied troops were captured. Was a deputy chairman of Settle Bench of magistrates and was president of Settle Rotary Club in 1966.
- Neil Townson was killed by a car in France aged 23 while on a year out between gaining his geography degree from Manchester University and starting work.
- Mr Jim Tosney born 1916 he worked in the family firm Cop Dyers of Alexandra Mills, Skipton. When war broke out he joined the Duke of Wellington's Regiment and later transferred to the RAF and flew Lancaster bombers. He was chairman, president and life member of Skipton Rugby Club. He leaves his wife Alice their son Nicholas born 1948 tragically died in 1985 and grandchildren Jonah and Anna.
- Mr Edmund Kirk born 1920 in Selby moving to Gargrave when aged 7. At EGS he was junior and senior champion athlete and vice-captain of both cricket and rugby. He spent his whole working life at Dewhurst's Mill. Joined the RAF and took part in the D-Day landings. His wife Eileen died 13 years ago, he leaves a son John and daughter Carol.
- Mr Tom Cooban born 1913 started in journalism with the West Yorkshire Pioneer and after serving with the 9th Armoured Division during the war became sub-editor of the Times for 13 years before becoming head of the news unit at the Central Office of Information. His wife Kathleen died in 1994 after 50 years marriage, he was predeceased by his daughter, Valerie but is survived by his son Michael and grandson Alexander.
- Mr Harry Bracewell aged 77 born in Barnoldswick. Server briefly in the North Atlantic and then started teaching, first at Church School, Barnoldswick and then at Barnoldswick Secondary Modern where he became head of English and later deputy headmaster. He retired in 1983. His first wife died in 1982 and he married Kathleen five years ago. He was president of Barnoldswick and Earby Rotary Club in 1992/1993.
- Mr Norman Fullalove aged 72 in Barnoldswick. Joined and later inherited the family printing business Carr's Printers, later Carrprint, and built it in to one of the area's key employers. Served as chairman and area chairman for Barnoldswick and Earby Round Table. He leaves his wife Joyce, three sons and 10 grandchildren.

- Tim Coughlin, a pupil with Glynis Evans of Skipton since aged seven, won the Lloyd Hartley Memorial Prize, awarded to the person from Leeds, Harrogate, Skipton or Lancaster, who gains the highest mark in grades 6, 7 or 8. He gained a distinction in Grade 8.
- Theatre Group Northern Broadsides performed **Blake Morrison**'s celebrated Yorkshire comedy, set in Skipton, called "the Cracked Pot", at the Auction Mart in October 2001.
- Howard Topper has been presented with the Scout Thanks Badge for 40 years devotion to Scouting.
- Richard MacSween (1962-1969) has had his first novel published by Andersen Press. The book for teenagers called "The Firing" is about a girl from Manchester who moves to a small village and finds there is nothing to do there.
- Former Head Boy **John Wightman** set off on a 240 mile walk to raise money for charity Raleigh International's work in Namibia where he would later go on a volunteer expedition.
- Former Head master David Buckroyd has been elected as new president of South Craven District Scout Council taking over from Colin Reeder.
- Michael Anderson completed 30 weeks of training to receive the coveted Green Beret the hallmark of commando troops.
- The Royal Navy's newest warship HMS St Albans, the 16<sup>th</sup> and last of the Duke Class Frigates to be built for the Royal Navy is commanded by **David Barker** of Earby who attended Ermysted's in the 70's. His brother Christopher was Head of School House. **Chris Watson**, of Colne, left to join the Navy in 1973 and both men commanded one of the Navy's finest ships, HMS Iron Duke.
- Duggie Sculthorpe (left in the late 60s). Played for the Skipton Town Minors the last team from these
  parts to win a County Cup and, after moving to Oldham, his contempories thought that he had died! He was
  discovered to be alive and well by Roger Ingham at Wigan where Duggie's son was playing rugby league
  for GB v Australia.
- A match between Skipton and Wharfedale produced a scoreline of 55-35 and raised £2,600 for the Marie
  Curie Cancer charity. In addition, a wager between Harry Crabtree and Jimmy Harrison as to who would
  have the longer playing career was finally settled with a framed £1 note handed over by Mrs Crabtree to
  Mrs Harrison in a busy ceremony after the game.
- Skipton's "Mr Sport" Roger Ingham received a North of England Athletics Association Merit Award at a
  presentation in Manchester. This award recognises the immense contribution of people like Roger who put
  so much time and energy into athletics without expecting any reward. He has enjoyed personal success at
  cross country over a remarkable five decades.
- Simon Smith was featured in the Craven Herald's "Dales Folk". Citing his love of the country life and terrier racing at the Broughton Game Show which he has helped organise for over 20 years.
- In May, **Peter Whitaker** wrote an article in the Craven Herald describing the "Barnoldswick Spud Roaster" train service from Barnoldswick to Skipton. School specials stopped at Earby, Thornton-in-Craven and Elslack. In a follow-up letter **Owen Oliver** described the alternative "Old Sal" no. 40 bus, run by Ezra Laycock and Sons. [Stories such as this would be good in future Chronicles Ed]
- Todd Oates who emigrated in December 1999 gained his first international cap representing New Zealand's U20 orienteering team which beat Australia on their own soil for the first time.
- James Mason who left School last summer having ran for England in an Under 20 World Championship Uphill Mountain Race whilst still at School represented Cambridge University in their annual cross-country varsity race against Oxford and in so doing earned himself a blue.

# Out of the Archives

## Out of the Archive: Rugby and Association Football at Ermysted's,

- 1876-1914

The recent appearance of soccer as a competitive sport at Ermysted's may raise the odd traditionalist eyebrow, but a delve into the School's archives reveals that there was a time when Rugby did not reign supreme.

The history of sport at Ermysted's effectively begins with the headmastership of E.T. Hartley (1876-1907), and the transfer of the School to its current Gargrave Road site in 1876/77. The revered figure of Hartley, himself a player with, and later President of, Skipton Football (Rugby) Club, recognised that sport should play an important role in young men's education. Significantly this sentiment was voiced in his first Speech Day address of 1877 where "he alluded to the necessity of attending to the physical as well as the mental training of children." The Hartley ethos was one that had flourished in Dr. Arnold's Rugby School in the 1830s and penetrated the English Public Schools in subsequent decades. Promoted as 'Muscular Christianity', team games claimed to be character building and encouraging of qualities like loyalty, team spirit, selflessness and a sense of honour. On a practical level, the new site offered the space for a games field, albeit a sloping one and easier access to Skipton Football Club's "Town Ground".

'Rugby' football, with its 'public schools' connections, was the obvious choice of winter sport for Hartley's aspirant, re-launched school, aiming - as it was - for a substantial 'boarding' clientele. Skipton Football Club, formed in 1874, dominated as it was by the sons of the local industrial and professional elite, must have given the rugby game in the town a prestige value that the Grammar School would have found difficult to ignore.

Available evidence, however, suggests that an immediate adoption of Rugby and a competitive interschools fixture list was slow to get off the ground. The first mention of a fixture, with another school, in the Craven Herald and Pioneer was November 1879: "Football – A match took place at Ilkley, on Wednesday, between the Scholars of Skipton Grammar School and those of Ilkley Collegiate School, when the latter team proved too strong for the visitors."

An interesting feature of the game in this era was the playing role of members of staff. Mr. Johns (1882-1892) played for the full Yorkshire County side and provided the cornerstone of the School's pack. In a school with limited numbers to draw from, his and Mr. Barham's presence allowed the team to be competitive and the fixture list to expand in the mid 1880s. Opponents by this stage included Bradford G.S., Leeds G.S., Saltaire G.S., Woodhouse Grove School, Skipton 'A', Skipton Church Institute and Ilkley Collegiate School. Another notable difference with the later set up was the absence of regular games sessions. Rather, the Headmaster would grant time for 'football practice' on an ad hoc basis, presumably when the weather was suitable.

The change to 'Association' Football in the autumn of 1890 is recorded by the perfunctory entry in the Chronicles of September: "School Committee votes to adopt Association football rules."

This appears to be a decision made by the students themselves, although what form the 'School Committee' took is impossible to determine. The reasons behind this are equally unclear. Lack of success, or anticipated lack of success in the fifteen-man game, might have been a factor, particularly as 1890 saw a dip in boys on roll to 70. It may have been influenced by the burgeoning popularity in the Association game - not dissimilar to the soccer boom in the 1990s - fostered by the setting up of the Football League in 1888 and the growing success in the game of northern clubs.

Thus the 'round ball' game took precedence for the next 17 years. Fixtures were numerous (31 in season 1904-05) and largely local. The less confrontational nature of the game enabled the School 1st XI to compete with adult teams on a more regular basis. One such was 'Skipton Tuesday' – a team of bank clerks and shopkeepers freed on the afternoon of this day by the town's 'half day' commercial closure. Still, the School felt disadvantaged and certain misgivings were voiced in the Easter Chronicles report of 1904:

"Nearly all our matches have been played against teams greatly our superiors in weight and in many cases our conquerors have learned their football at the School."

Another sign that soccer had its detractors in the School came in the form of a senior debate in November 1905, where the motion was "The supremacy of Association Football over Rugby." The motion was lost by one vote; a senior master, Mr. Williamson, spoke in favour of Rugby claiming that it was "for sportsmen, not navvies." That rugby should be the topic of debate at this juncture, may be to do with the huge public interest generated by the touring New Zealand "All Blacks" – a side that was to lose but once in 33 matches.

Nevertheless, soccer at Ermysted's appeared in reasonable health in the early 1900s. In what turned out to be the final season (1906-07) a playing record of played 19, won 10, lost 6 and drew 3 was recorded – no apparent crisis here! More intriguing still, the 2nd XI report (Easter 1907) for that season contained the line: "We hope to give them a fuller fixture list next season." This is a powerful indication that the imminent switch to Rugby in September 1907 was not foreseen or planned well in advance.



Unlike the change to Association in 1890, which was the result of pressure from the below, the change to Rugby in the autumn of 1907 has every indication of pressure from above. Taking over as Headmaster from Hartley in September 1907 was the 28 year-old, J.A. Shawyer. He had played the game to a high level, learning it at Durham School and playing for Oxford University and the Cumberland County side. Brought in by the Governors to inject new vigour into the life of the School, Shawyer certainly wielded a 'new broom' – too much of one as his brief one year tenure of office testifies.

At this time Ermysted's – then known as Skipton Grammar School – appears to have made a substantial bid to upgrade its status. The School's adoption of William Ermysted's coat of arms in 1907 was clearly a gesture in this direction, as was the switch back to 'Rugby' football. The 'Public School' image of Rugby Union had been sharpened further by Northern clubs' break away to 'professionalism' (later 'Rugby League') in 1895. Ermysted's was now to compete on the rugby field with some of the most prestigious schools in the north of England. A strong indication that Rugby's reintroduction in 1907 was Shawyer's decision is provided in the brief 'Vale', in the 'Chronicles' [Midsummer 1908], marking his departure:

"...this is hardly the place to enlarge upon the ideals of scholarship and life that he has set before us, but his influence upon school athletics has been no less marked. During the past year, the change to Rugby football has given us the opportunity of playing Sedbergh, Giggleswick, and Leeds Grammar Schools."

The transition to rugby union turned out to be a successful one, albeit with some demoralising, hard lessons along the way. The first competitive match in this new era for the School was against Leeds Grammar School 2<sup>nd</sup> XV on 19th October 1907, Ermysted's winning by 19 points to 3. Wins were registered in the next two fixtures before being thrashed heavily by Sedbergh 2<sup>nd</sup>s, 56 points to nil. The newly introduced individual match report in the Chronicles rather tersely reminded players of the basic essentials of the game:

"The only way to stop a rush is by falling on the ball. The team as a whole are too prone to trust to a flying kick in attempting to clear their line, a relic no doubt of Association."

Nevertheless, the game of rugby had established very healthy roots by 1914. Seasons 1911-12, 1912-13 and 1913-14 all saw significantly more wins than losses. The School's position on the rugby map was acknowledged in 1912 by the Yorkshire RFU sending a strong 'Yorkshire Wanderers' XV team to play at 'Sandylands'. Moreover, individuals progressed into the high-flying Skipton Football Club, such as J.C. McIntyre; whilst still at School in 1912 he played a key part in the Club's triumph in the Yorkshire Cup Final against Otley. Unfortunately, like many promising sportsmen of this era, McIntyre was to be killed in his prime in the 1914-18 War. For the School 1st XV the 1913-14 season topped all that had gone before it, highlights being double victories over Bradford and Wakefield 1st XVs. The die had been cast for the rest of the 20th century for Ermysted's to be a 'rugby' school.

In summary, whilst not losing sight of the reality that sport, at Ermysted's, was a recreational activity, it did play an important part in shaping the development of the School. In certain ways it helped to define the wider ethos of the place, and in 1907 seemed inextricably linked in with broader issues of School policy.

Over Easter, a party of 47 Y8-Y10 pupils went on a very successful skiing trip to Les Deux Alpes near Lyon in France. They were accompanied by six adults including Mr and Mrs Hopkins, Mr Head and Mrs Hall.

There was the annual Year 7 visit to the Lake District.

# **History Trip**

### Year 10 Visit to First World War Battlefield of Belgium and France

In May 2002 a party of 49 students and staff departed home and school for a four day visit to the battlefields of the Western Front.

Our first full touring day was spent in and around the Belgian town of Ypres – an area repeatedly fought over between 1914-18, and best remembered for the first gas attack in 1915 and the notorious Battle of Passchedaele in 1917. Messines Ridge – the scene of many British underground explosions in June 1917 – was the first destination, followed by the famous War Museum in the Ypres Cloth Hall. Lunch was spent at Sanctuary Wood Café/Museum. Here a section of the trenches and tunnels are well preserved, and artefacts and gruesome photographs lent graphic realism to what we had been learning about. Later in the afternoon we headed to Tyne Cot cemetery where once deadly German 'pillboxes' nestle among the thousands of British gravestones. At the massive memorial to lost soldiers there, we found the names of two Old Boys of Ermysted's who were killed in the same attack on 16<sup>th</sup> August 1917: Second Lieutenants Frank Gill and Granville Berry M.C., both of the West Yorkshire Regiment. A minute's silence was held on their behalf. The day was rounded off with a meal in Ypres and attendance at the moving daily ceremony at the Menin Gate memorial.

The next day's destination was the Somme region of Northern France that is best remembered for the 1916 Offensive, and particularly, the tragic opening day of that battle – the 1st July – when 60,000 of Britain's volunteer soldiers fell. Our enthusiastic and knowledgeable guide, Tom Morgan, guided us skilfully through the day's itinerary. Sites of interest included the Thiepval Memorial and Beaumont Hamel – a battlefield of special significance to Newfoundland, as its one battalion was practically decimated there on the 1st July. A short 'hike' to the Serre battlefield showed the poignant scene of the 'black day' of several northern "Pals" battalions.

On our last evening in Belgium we sought the fun and relaxation of a ten-pin bowling alley, where the slick technique of Mr. Wiggan took the honours in the Staff match. By the end of the night, sleep was the only option, as Mr Fryer patrolled the dormitories with ruthless efficiency. The next morning, bidding a not so 'fond farewell' to Hotel 'Diligence' and its obsession with chicken meals – cooked or otherwise! – we headed for Calais and the Channel ferry.

In almost all respects the visit had been a success, not least in the good behaviour of the Year 10 boys who went, and their sense of respect for the sacred sights they visited.

### **Adventurous Activities**

The year was meant to get off to a flying start in the Autumn for the Duke of Edinburgh group with a venture practice in the peak district. With foot and mouth still causing problems it was not a straightforward task to go ahead with the walk. The plan was to be away from Friday night until Sunday night, staying in a bunkhouse on the Friday and camping over on the Saturday. Everything was in place when I was struck down by shingles brought on by an electric shock. Unfortunately we could not get another Mountain Leader to cover my absence so the whole weekend had to be cancelled. Although we hoped to re-run the practice in the Summer Term it would seem that the local accommodation was so badly hit by the foot and mouth that nothing suitable for the route was available so instead we headed for the Lake-District.

In contrast to the problems with the expedition work the Navigation Course went pretty well with following gaining the Nation Award:

The course entails building navigation skills until the students can confidently walk from one point to another over quite difficult terrain using map and compass.

A very successful feature of this year's outdoor activities was a Summer Term walk. Jo Wherity, James Darbyshire, Glyn Williams, David Stockdale, Ben Eyre, Martyn Needham, Ben Kay, Andrew Little, Nick Gooch and Sam Ford formed a good mix of year 10 and sixth formers. Day one was a circuit of the Coniston Horseshoe in near perfect weather. We had a very comfortable overnight stay at Hawkshead Youth Hostel and the following day, again in beautiful weather we explored the Langdale Pikes. All enjoyed it thoroughly, even the staff!

Another successful activity was outdoor climbing with Mr Edward supervising and myself assisting. We had quite a few productive and enjoyable evenings climbing at Crookrise behind Embsay.

With reflection on the strengths and weaknesses of last year it was decided to change the format of the Wednesday afternoon activities. Although the Duke of Edinburgh group is still active, it is now extracurricular. What is offered each Wednesday is an outdoor activity that will run as a progressive course for each half term or term. Students subscribe to a course for its duration with no further commitment.

The courses offered are: A National Navigation Award in the first half term; an indoor climbing course before Christmas; a trail running course after Christmas; expedition training up until Easter and mountain biking in the summer term.

The first course to be run this year is the National Navigation Award with some of those who were successful last year going on to the next level this year. Indeed it might be possible that most of them will achieve a Silver Award with Ben Lister going on to do Gold.

# Simbach Exchange

This year's exchange was one of the most memorable - not only for the headaches it caused!

Everything was set by the end of the Summer Term: partners were matched up and swapping mail, traditional and electronic, but just a fortnight before the planned departure of the Skipton pupils in October, news came through from Bavaria that the authorities could not permit a school group to travel there from a country still endangered by Foot and Mouth Disease.

Protracted discussions took place as to whether the exchange might eventually be allowed to go ahead, or whether it should be cancelled totally for the current school year. This clearly would deprive a whole year group of this particular opportunity to travel (as had happened for the German partners last Spring) and would be especially unfortunate in the 20<sup>th</sup> year of twinning between Skipton and Simbach. Fortunately, a 'stay of execution' was granted, and by January we were able to plan for the German visitors to come to Skipton as usual, just before Easter, and for Skipton partners to travel, unusually, immediately after Easter. This revised timing for our visit had clear disadvantages, coming in the thick of Year 10 modules, and taking some staff away from Year 11-13 exam preparation. It also meant that a few pupils on each side had to withdraw because of changed circumstances. However, thanks to the generous attitude of the Head Master and the co-operation of other staff affected, we were able to enjoy a couple of additional advantages. The boys were learning German as second foreign language, so it meant that they had had more time to brush up their German before embarking on the trip; secondly, we were able to see Simbach and surroundings in new Spring conditions, rather than the usual Autumn colouring.

The programme of activities in both locations was very much as in previous years, and all participants – 20 boys, 22 girls, Mesdames Berry and Pate and Messrs Gregory and Jones - seemed to enjoy the experience. Several really excellent diaries of the visit to Simbach were produced, though more of this standard came from SGHS than from EGS, and the Skipton-Simbach Twinning Association maintained its recent tradition of awarding gift tokens to the best: Jessica Yeh received first prize, Cara Shepherd second, and Robert Anderson third, and diaries by Ruth Clements and Luke Charnley were 'highly commended'.

A reporter for the local newspaper interviewed several pupils, and the following impressions appeared in the Passauer Neue Presse (the German might have been slightly adjusted by the reporter!):

Mahmoud Hassan (14): "Es war sehr interessant zu sehen, wie die Leute hier leben. Ich war das erste Mal in Deutschland und habe immer gedacht, die wären technisch total hinten. Ist gar nicht so: alles ist up to date. Im Radio werden auch gar nicht so viele deutsche Songs gespielt, wie ich dachte. Das Essen ist zum Teil sehr interessant."

Michael Fox (15): "Mir hat alles hier in Simbach sehr gut gefallen. Vor allem die Landschaft hat mich begeistert. Das Essen hat auch sehr gut geschmeckt. Die Leute sind sehr freundlich und nett hier. Ich habe sogar ein bisschen Deutsch gelernt in meiner Gastfamilie. Wir waren auch in München unterwegs, das hat viel Spaß gemacht."

Teachers on both sides were emphatic in their support of the exchange, very pleased that it had finally taken place, and held a joint planning meeting in Simbach in preparation for the next one.

## Year 7 Trip to Jodrell Bank

On Thursday the 11th April most of year 7 went on a school outing to Jodrell Bank. We travelled by coach and once there we were given a quiz on the centre. We had to search around the centre for the answers while taking part in the hands-on activities. There were a few Radar dishes and a massive sound telescope. The highlight of the trip was the planetarium show. This was a room filled with seats and a projection of stars was shown on the ceiling of the room.

We learnt about important stars and constellations and where they are in the night sky. At the end of the outing we had a picnic and purchased items from the shop before leaving. On the way home the bus driver got lost so it took longer to get back to Skipton.

# **Paperclip Physics 2002**

It took all four of the others to hold James back from going to get one. Unfortunately the boys were left with a ringing in their ears after the Doppler effect team claimed the prize. The boys left dejectedly until they were given a free flashing bouncy ball, a calculator and a pen - suddenly the world seemed to have justice.

#### School Science Review

Ben Lister and James Green (both Y12) attended the National Conference of the Student Review of the Science Committee which took place in March. This Conference forms part of the national review of the KS3/4 Science Curriculum. Those in attendance were senior representatives of all the examining bodies, QCA, The Nuffield Foundation, Baroness Ashton on behalf of the government, representatives from the professional bodies as well as professors of Education from several universities. Also in attendance was Sam Ford (Y12) who was selected to give evidence to a Select Committee of the Science and Technology Committee of the House of Commons who are currently conducting in an inquiry into Science Education from 14-19. The Select Committee was keen to hear directly from students about their personal experience of the science curriculum.

### **School Notes and Miscellanea**

The School has a new trophy - to be awarded each year. This results from the awarding of Merit points to pupils in Years 7 to 9. The pupil who received the most merit points this year - 12 in total - was Chris Greenwood from 7M. Runner up was Ben Rusius with 9, closely followed by Morgan Blizzard and James Januszewski.

On a non-uniform day over £500 was raised for the National Children's Home.

Curriculum changes

All boys in Year 7 now study both German and French. Latin will be introduced in Year 8 September 2002. On Tuesdays we introduced a nine period day (each of 35 minutes as opposed to 7 x 40mins + 1 x 35mins). The start of School, lunch time and the end of day bell remained unchanged. This proved unpopular and from September 2002 all days will have eight periods.

This year, for the first time, universities not only had the outcome of GCSE results and a school reference to hand, but also results from AS modules taken at the end of Year 12. These will have influenced many offers received from UCAS, particularly in cases where pupils applied for popular and oversubscribed courses.

Over recent years, Information Technology has played an increasingly important part, not only across the academic curriculum but also in the administration of the School. We have seen the recent expansion in terms of facilities of a second IT Room and a further one is planned in our new building and, in addition, the School Office has benefited from updated software to assist with the management of the vast amount of pupil information that is required nowadays. Mr Hardiman has been released from some of his teaching commitments and will oversee the ICT systems in school. As a consequence we have made a new appointment for next September in Mr Greenfield, an experienced graduate who has had considerable ICT experience in industry. His appointment has enabled us to offer IT as an AS subject in Year 12 from September 2002.

The combined collection of Tesco Coupons this year and last lead to the School receiving one computer and a digital camera.

Admissions - following the tests for entry into Year 7 for next September, there were 131 boys to whom places could have been offered. Letters were sent to 87 successful applicants at the beginning of March of whom 50 were resident in-catchment, representing 57% of our intake and 27.9 % of eligible boys, the largest percentage in recent years. Whilst it is pleasing to note that the School is popular and oversubscribed, it is disappointing that this year there is a large number of able out-catchment boys who cannot be accommodated.

As a consequence of the building work, the entrance into School that leads to the School Office will be closed to all traffic from September 2002 except for that involved with the construction work. A temporary car park has been excavated on the 'bottom' between the two drives for staff vehicles. Pupils will have to park offsite.

On Friday 31st May there was a Red, White and Blue day for the Queen's Golden Jubilee. Each boy received a Jubilee Crown in a commemorative wallet. This was financed by the School Foundation.

### 50 Years Ago - 1951/1952

Head master was Mr M.L. Forster. Head of School was M.G. Liddle.

On February 7<sup>th</sup> a special service was held in Big School in memory of His Majesty King George the Sixth. Most of those present had been born in the late King's reign.

The School War Memorial Fund stood at £4,000 – a figure "where one might begin to think of the possibility of building a school hall."

The arrival of the BBC was the highlight of the year. They were in school to record a 50 minute transmission for Children's Hour (Northern Edition) on Sunday January 27<sup>th</sup> entitled "Historic Schools of the North – I", the first in a new series of "Other People's Schools". An Old Boy, the Rev. E.W. Heaton, Dean of Caius College, Cambridge is revisiting his old school. All parts in the dramatic episodes were played by members of the school. Miss Bertha Lonsdale, the script writer had been to the school on several occasions to confer with Mr Forster and Mr Gibbon and once to see the matinee of "Henry IV". The script comprised dramatic episodes from the history of the school based on Mr Gibbon's book, interviews with people of the present and "flashes" from school activites such as prayers, the play, a class and so on.

The Jazz Band made a recording for the BBC which was broadcast on March 15<sup>th</sup>. The leader B. Bamber (first trumpet), was supported by R. Hudson (second trumpet), G.Kippax (guitar), G.Kay (drums), M. Bell (bass) and P.U. Tillotson (piano).

The choir recorded carols in the Parish Church for the Skipton Round Table's Christmas Tree fund.

The Cross Country Concert was described as "crowded, soon became noisy, later became steaming hot."!

A "television receiving set" was installed in School House purchased by the boys and masters with help from some Old Boys.

The charge for the Chronicles was raised to 1s. 6d. The Old Boys' dinner was held in the Devonshire Hotel, Skipton.

"The use of the school blazer has become general, greatly improving the collective appearance. Too often, however, the smart appearance of the blazer is marred by an undersized and sometimes dirty cap perched precariously on one side of the head. Can something be done about this fashion which has long been carried beyond the point of absurdity?"

The high jump pit near the cricket pavilion was completed. Most of the work was done by two boarders, J. Schofield and J.C. Balme although they were helped by many boys from School House.

On speech day Mr G.B. Drayson, M.P. for the Skipton Division, presented the prizes. He urged the boys to take every opportunity to travel abroad and told them "not to neglect the Empire for they still had a splendid Commonwealh and Empire where there were many opportunities open to an Englishman."

### 25 Years Ago - 1976/1977

Headmaster was Mr J.H. Woolmore. Head of School was Darrell Brayshay with a deputy in M. Hollingworth. Heads of Houses were N.J. Watts (S), S.J.C. Dixon (E), A. Massey (P), I. Thompson (T), M.S. Mitchell (H) and C. Smith (C).

There was "an increased measure of co-operation between Ermysted's and the Girls' High School. Several girls took part in the school play and, on the academic side, one girl is taking her 'A' level Maths course with the lower sixth at Ermysted's." [In September 2002 two girls started 'A' level maths – Ed.] The [Joint] Sixth Form society was reconstituted and events included Hockey and Basketball fixtures, a Balloon Debate and a trip to the ice rink.

"Local Government reorganisation and the redrawing of boundaries has resulted in Barnoldswick and Earby joining Lancashire, and it has been decided, that from September 1976, boys from West Craven shall no longer be admitted to Ermysted's."

"Through the generosity of the Parents' Association and the School Governors, the school now possesses a Colour Television Set and a Video Cassette Recorder."

The school play was "The Devil's Disciple" by George Bernard Shaw produced by Mr Douglass and Mr Osborne. There were four performances, two in the evening and two matinees – one for SGHS. For the boys show there was an option of either watching the show or doing Games.

The Christmas concert took the form of a performance by the combined choirs and strings of SGHS and EGS, of Benjamin Britten's cantata "Saint Nicolas".

Trevor Edwards retired after 37 years service to the school.

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
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
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
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
